


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## A MOONLIGHT CYCLING TOUR ALONG THE "WILD COAST"

All the excitement of a hike along a moonlit beach was experienced by nine hardy and adventurous U.C.H.C. cyclists the week-end of October 29-30. We wended our way along 18 miles of the "South Coast, a wild coast...", south of Carmel; our ultimate destination-Big Sur State Park.

The trip was marked by a number of firsts in U.C.H.C. tradition. We enjoyed the company of three Helens, Helen Maurer, Helen Bingham, and Helen Grauer, though I shoudl not fail to mention Letitia Reams. The hero prize should go to Pierre Gros for pedaling a gearless bike the entire 36 miles. The medal for the most experienced cyclist should go to Meyer Elkaim; he brought along a set of repair took!

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#### SKI MOUNTAINEERING
